Wolgemuth is being rescheduled to the January Council meeting.</p> <p>B. Graduate Student Peer Support Program (GSPS) Presentation</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Lorelei Betke, HSE Strategy & Engagement Officer, HRHSE - Health Safety & Environment, & Julia Hu, Grad Research Assistantship, HRHSE - Health Safety & Environment ● J. Hu and L. Betke introduced themselves and provided a detailed overview of the new Graduate Student Peer Support (GSPS) Program, a pilot initiative developed under the university's Culture of Care Safety Action Plan. J. Hu explained that the program trains graduate students to act as "peer supporters," offering empathetic listening, guidance, and referrals to campus resources rather than professional counselling. L. Betke described the origins of the program, noting that it was created in recognition of challenges such as isolation and the power differential between students and supervisors. They reported that the program received 60 applications over the summer and ultimately selected 11 peer supporters from a broad range of faculties, representing diverse academic and cultural backgrounds. The peer supporters were trained in areas such as mental health foundations, suicide prevention, cultural awareness, and resource navigation. The presenters outlined how the intake and matching process works, the short-term nature of the support offered, and the program's broader goal of serving as a bridge to long-term supports and communities. 	

		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● GSPS uses a structured and thoughtful intake system designed to ensure that graduate students are paired with peer supporters who best understand their concerns, backgrounds, and needs. J. Hu explained that once the program launched its website, interested students seeking support are directed to an online Google Form that functions as the primary intake form. In this form, students provide information about their presenting concerns and their reasons for seeking peer support, such as academic stress, interpersonal issues, or challenges navigating university systems. The intake also includes a brief mental health screener to identify whether the student may be experiencing moderate to severe mental health distress. This screener does not diagnose conditions, but instead helps the program ensure that students with higher-risk concerns can be guided promptly toward appropriate professional services. ● After a form is submitted, J. Hu personally reviews each entry. She considers several factors in order to make the most appropriate match: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● The nature of the student’s concerns and whether a supporter with specific lived experience would be helpful. ● The educational background and faculty of each peer supporter, allowing students to be matched with someone who may share similar academic environments or pressures. ● Shared interests or identities, when relevant, to help students feel more comfortable and understood. ● Language preferences, as the program’s peer supporters collectively speak a variety of languages including Mandarin, Sindhi, Urdu, Malayalam, Persian, and Hindi. ● Any relevant skills, training, or prior experience that peer supporters may bring to the relationship. ● J. Hu explained that this matching approach is designed not only to address practical concerns, but also to help the student feel a sense of connection with someone who understands their context. Once matched, peer supporters typically meet with their assigned student for up to three sessions, with a maximum of six total hours of support. The intention is for the program to act as a bridge, offering empathetic listening, guidance, and referrals, before helping the student transition to longer-term supports or communities elsewhere on campus. ● They concluded by asking councillors to help promote the initiative and described ongoing evaluation plans, including monthly meetings and future satisfaction surveys. ● H. Kemuma, VP Student Life, asked regarding the number of volunteers chosen. L. Betke replied that all submissions were great candidates, but if 	
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		<p>they picked too many, the volunteers would not get a chance to work with any clients. She believed they wanted to go with 10 candidates, but could not choose, so instead chose 11. J. Hu replied that other universities with a peer support program have 10 volunteers.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • She noted that their email is gsp@ualberta.ca • S. Iqbal, VP Student Services, noted that C. Okafor, VP Academic, and himself were involved in the interviews for the candidates and confirmed the competency of the candidates. Many were first-year graduate students and for these positions, they wanted to have second-year+ students for more experience on campus to impart. They also did not want to pick too many monolingual candidates.

Kumar began his report by thanking GSA staff and volunteers for their continued efforts, noting that recent GSA events were highly successful and saw very strong attendance. He emphasized that current GSA programming regularly attracts 200–300 participants, and while this reflects significant student engagement, it also exposes the GSA's limited administrative capacity. b. He reported that the GSA is currently facing operational constraints, primarily because there is only one staff member handling a large volume of administrative and event-related work. He explained that although DEOs help where they can, the current workload presents risks, including inadequate support during large events and inconsistent follow-through on administrative processes. c. A. Kumar stated that the GSA currently has no Associate Director, and that the organization will be hiring a replacement. He added that the GSA is also exploring hiring one additional staff member within the existing budget to help improve our capacity. He explained that there is financial room to take this step and that increased staffing is necessary to sustainably support events, registrations, approvals, health & dental operations, and other student services. d. He further highlighted that the transition to the new health and dental plan has created a significant increase in administrative complexity. He noted that staff members and the VP Student Services have borne the burden of resolving student issues 	<p>*See Legend</p>

		<p>arising from the transition. He stated that additional staff capacity is essential for delivering timely support.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> e. Outside his written report, A. Kumar informed the Council that he had been formally notified by the Vice-Provost that the Ministry of Advanced Education has approved the concept of Exceptional Tuition Increases (ETIs) for certain programs. He explained that ETIs may be approved through either a joint proposal from the GSA and the University, or a direct proposal from the University. In either case, ETIs may exceed the standard 2% domestic tuition cap and must be used to improve program quality. f. He reported that the Ministry is currently discussing ETIs for three programs: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> i. Master of Nursing ii. Nursing PhD iii. Master of School & Clinical Child Psychology g. He noted that the University's Deans are already involved and that graduate student input will be required through the upcoming tuition consultation cycle. h. A. Kumar explained that the Ministry has extended the deadline for submitting additional ETI proposals to December, meaning more programs could potentially be added. However, he also noted that administrative workload may outweigh the revenue in very small programs (e.g., those with only 4–11 students), and that the University may reconsider the value of applying for ETIs in those cases. i. He stated that the GSA has resubmitted its Tuition & Fees Consultation Proposal, reiterating two key recommendations: <ul style="list-style-type: none"> i. That the University not increase tuition for thesis-based students; and ii. That the University funds the Course-Based Master's Scholarship by reallocating institutional loan resources into the relevant endowment, which currently holds \$433,000. j. A. Kumar met with the AASUA President, who stated that they have not ratified the agreement currently. We will know by tomorrow. If there is action, we will hold a Town Hall with AASUA to ensure that students have all the necessary information. <p>B. Vice-President Academic: Chen Okafor</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. As submitted, as C. Okafor was unable to attend due to class scheduling <p>C. Vice-President External: Niloufar Mir Fallah</p>

As submitted E. Vice-President Student Life: Hazel Kemuma <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. H. Kemuma thanked graduate students for attending our events this semester and month. She reported on the Speedfriending event, which 150+ graduate students attended. The event was for first-year students to make friends and combat isolation. b. She also highlighted the Turkey Trot Run, which occurred on October 5th. We had over 280 participants, despite the cool weather, and over 100 kids joined. This event was suggested out of the Town Hall at the beginning of her term, where students submitted what they wanted to see as part of the GSA Social Hours. She thanked graduate students for making the event such a success. c. We also held a Thanksgiving Potluck Dinner, which was held in campus residence. The dinner was particularly for campus residence students and international students, who are unable to return home for the holiday, to be able to gather and share a meal and what they're thankful for. We had 200+ students participate, 100 being graduate students. d. We had the Graduate/Alumni Mixer on Friday, which brought together grad students, alumni and university staff. President Flanagan, the Chancellor and University Senator attended. The event intended to bring graduate students together with potential mentors or employers, as well as being a social gathering. We had around 180 attendees. e. The executives went to Campus Saint-Jean for a Meet & Grill event by invitation of Sophie Nguemo Medongoum, Campus Saint Jean Councillor, and met with CSJ students and faculty. This is one of the steps the executives are taking to involve our extension campuses. f. We have not had an EDIC meeting as of yet, so the report will be given at the next Council. F. Vice-President Student Services: Saad Iqbal <ul style="list-style-type: none"> a. Know Your Services tabling is ongoing - the next one is scheduled for Tuesday, October 29th in CAB between 9:30AM-3:30PM. The other executives have been supporting this tabling, which briefs graduate students on available services, such as the health and dental plan, GSA bursaries, awards, childcare grants, childminding services, the GSAP and available study spaces. He encouraged Councillors to attend and spread the word to 	
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		<p>students for the upcoming tabling sessions, which will be advertised in the GSA newsletter.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> b. S. Iqbal and staff met with the UofA Calgary campus satellite campus coordinator to discuss how the GSA can support satellite students there and if there are any tailored supports or advocacy efforts needed. We are taking steps to create a Council seat for this and other satellite campuses to ensure their needs are heard. c. Mental Health Action Plan has successfully been launched, with the report on the university website. d. S. Iqbal's email address is in his report for any feedback e. Campus Food Bank general meeting: as the co-Chair, he addressed the AGM and they selected new Board members. f. S. Iqbal and Kevin Friese, Assistant Dean SSE (Student Success & Experience - formerly the Dean of Students), discussed the influenza flu clinic, which will be running around campus, and the hydroponics farm project. Ravina Sanghera, Vice-Provost SSE, is organizing a location for the pilot project. S. Iqbal is also continuing last year's mental health photo contest, previously in collaboration with the ISA and SSE. g. Meet & Grill event at CSJ: many executives were able to attend, speak with grad students and faculty members, and meet with the Associate Dean of Research Graduate Studies. S. Nguemo Medongoum, Campus Saint Jean Councillor, is helping us bring CSJ perspectives to Council and see how we can expand our services and reach to their campus. h. The Dose of Support program has begun again and will be running from October 16 to December 18. Carleton asked for further context - is the motion required to ensure the issue is being dealt with or to fast-track it? Why is this motion necessary? • E. Derksen, GSA ED, explained that T. Dubé has supplied an interpretation of the policy. He commented that the Council should be aware that it created a Board as its highest administrative standing committee and that it can be risky for Council to set a precedent to intervene and involve itself in operations where its fundamental mandate is policy governance. This is not a governance issue. He emphasized that he is not speaking for or against the motion, but it is the Board's mandate to make responsible, diligent decisions through due process, which would involve, in this case, a reasonable, proper and consistent interpretation of policy. The Board is the administrative body 	
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		<p>of the Council. The issue is that it involves money and the transfer of money, which involves liability for the GSA. In order for the GSA to make reasonable and proper decisions, Council has historically delegated this to the Board, and the Board has coverage through something called directors and officers liability insurance, so we go through all reasonable means, finding good advice - legal counsel if we need it - when we make financial decisions in order to be compliant with both the Income Tax Act and financial tracking laws because we're responsible for what we do with our funds, and we become liable for dealing with them appropriately. If Council votes, Councillors would take that liability upon themselves, personally. He emphasized that he states this as a matter of knowledge and awareness, as Councillors need to know what they're saying 'yes' or 'no' to when involving themselves in operational decisions.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● C. Cowan noted that this has been brought up in previous reports and that where the funding goes was not brought up as a reason for holdup - if the graduate student funds will be spent, they need to be approved by finance and go through the proper channels, which was creating the delay. We get audited and there are steps that must be taken for diverting nearly \$8,000, which could open Council up to different liabilities. Z. Patel explained that for fund allocation, it goes through the Finance Team (ED, President, Accountant), BFC and Board for approval, which is reflected in policy. ● A. Adigun, Educational Policy Councillor, asserted that it is a governance issue as well as operational matter, as the Council decided on the allocations of the funds in the budget and that it was his understanding that it would be spent to pay an official. Patel confirmed that it only concerns Council - it would be up to each committee if they would like to adopt similar documents or be included in this document. ● M. Dear Council Colleagues,

I hope your studies are going well as we approach the final weeks of the semester. I have been away for a few weeks now; both for Reading Week and also for a graduate education conference that took place in Ottawa. I will talk more about this later on in my report. This semester has seen me host an Academic Supervision Q&A and assist countless students with academic related concerns. I am also working on a proposal around tuition that will be completed soon. In the meantime, please see below for the most pertinent meetings related to my portfolio.

Graduate Program Support Team (October 20th, 2025)

In this meeting we discussed some course changes in the faculty of rehabilitation medicine, the faculty of nursing and the faculty of ALES (Agriculture, Life and Environmental Sciences). We also had a healthy discussion about a new graduate certificate in Population Health as well as another certificate in Policy Leadership. There were two additional graduate certificates in Data Science & AI, and in Indigenous Law. Finally, there was an update to the readmission policy for students who are looking to resume their studies at the U of A after a hiatus.

CTL Advisory Meeting (October 22nd, 2025)

Instructors in February of next year will have the opportunity to open their classrooms up for observation in what's known as Open Classroom Days. It is an opportunity for instructors to open their classroom to peers as well as visit other's classes in a collegial, non-evaluative environment. The CTL student ambassadors will represent the student voice at the event, as well as provide opening and closing remarks.

GFC Ad-Hoc Committee on Academic Governance (CAG) (October 29th, 2025)

Our discussions continued over what to do regarding the composition of the GFC, and whether that is affecting the overall effectiveness of the body. CAG is a committee tasked with looking at the composition of the GFC, among other things.

Advisory Working Group on International Student Thesis Based Tuition (October 29th, 2025)

During this meeting GPS (Graduate and Postdoctoral Studies) presented some options in terms of what can be done around tuition rates, including the idea of harmonizing domestic and international tuition which would ultimately lead to a financial loss for the university.

MNIF Joint Oversight (October 31st, 2025)

In this meeting we engaged in a healthy discussion about mandatory non instructional fees and the purpose they bring to the student experience.

CAGS (Canadian Association for Graduate Studies) Conference 2025 (November 4th, 2025)

I attended CAGS 2025 in Ottawa from November 4th – November 7th which was a conference on the graduate education landscape in Canada. Tracy from FGPS and several of the associate deans from her office also attended as well as presented on academic supervision, academic regulations and AI. The biggest takeaway for me was the opportunity to network with other graduate student associations, university professors and administrators from across the country.

Tuition Budget Advisory Committee (November 18th, 2025)

We talked about the forthcoming tuition rates for graduate students, including steps the university can take to mitigate increases for graduate students who are struggling.

1. Indigenous Awards Update

Two new Indigenous-focused awards have been submitted to the Awards Selection Committee for inclusion in the upcoming 2025–26 awards cycle. These awards will open on December 1, 2025, alongside all other GSA Recognition Awards, with adjudication completed jointly by the Vice President Indigenous Relations and First Peoples' House to ensure cultural relevance and integrity. All awards will be presented at GSA Awards Night on March 12, 2026.

What has been proposed is the following...

Indigenous Graduate Student Award

Two awards valued at \$1,000 each will be offered annually. One award will be funded by the Graduate Students' Association and the other will be funded by the Indigenous Graduate Students' Association. These awards recognize First Nations, Inuit, and Métis graduate students for academic excellence, leadership, and meaningful contributions to community wellness, advocacy, and cultural revitalization.

Apparently, there is an agreement until 2027 agreement between the GSA and First Peoples' House that went unadvertised and unfunded for a few years in regard to what was the Indigenous Graduate Student Award. The exact number of unpaid years is currently being confirmed so that this amount can be made up this year, potentially through a third one-time award. My understanding is that while there was an Indigenous Graduate Student Award awarded a few times, it followed a different application timeline and the student did not attend the Award Night in March, so this would be to change this to follow along better. Also, the amount has been \$750, but we will be adjusting it to be \$1000 annually.

Reconciliation in Action Award

A non-monetary annual recognition award will also be offered to acknowledge University of Alberta staff or faculty members (Indigenous or non-Indigenous) who demonstrate sustained commitment to supporting Indigenous graduate students, advancing reconciliation, and promoting cultural safety. Nominees must be nominated by a current Indigenous graduate student.

Both awards will follow the same application opening date, closing date, and adjudication timeline as all other GSA Recognition Awards to ensure visibility, fairness, and accessibility.

2. Cultural Safety and DEO Onboarding

Ongoing collaboration continues with Dr. Florence Glanfield, the IGSA, and the GSA Board to support healing and to strengthen culturally grounded practices within the Association. A March 2026 session is being organized through *Moonlit Horizons Consulting* for the current and incoming executive team, featuring the KAIROS Blanket Exercise, with invitations extended to GSA staff, department councillors, individuals in GSA roles, and members of all GSA committees. In addition, discussions with the Faculty of Native Studies are underway to co-create sustainable onboarding materials and culturally grounded transition support for future GSA leaders to ensure that cultural safety, reconciliation, and respectful governance remain embedded in all leadership transitions.

3. Indigenous Governance and Community Connection

The VP Indigenous Relations and the Indigenous Graduate Students' Association are establishing kiyokewin, a monthly virtual visiting circle for Indigenous graduate students. Kiyokewin, meaning visiting in Cree and Northern Michif and named by Meredith Leary, will offer a culturally grounded space for connection, sharing, and belonging in a relaxed, tea-time environment. The first session is being planned for January, with recurring monthly gatherings to follow. The VPIR and IGSA are collaborating with miyomahcihowin to explore opportunities for collaboration and ongoing supports as the initiative moves forward. A monthly virtual opportunity for Indigenous graduate students across campuses to connect is incredibly important to us.

4. VPIR-related Bylaws & Policies

Comprehensive amendments to all Vice President Indigenous Relations–related bylaws and policies have been submitted to the Speaker for the November Council meeting. These revisions are intended to strengthen Indigenous representation, clarify electoral processes, uphold Indigenous self-governance (sovereignty), and ensure alignment with the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, and the University of Alberta Indigenous Strategic Plan. Although the goal was to bring these amendments directly to Council for decision, they have instead been referred to the Elections and Referenda Committee and the Governance Committee for further review before advancing.

Despite being a voting member of the Governance Committee, no meeting has been scheduled at a time when I am not attending lectures, and my name has still not been added to the Governance Committee listing on the Graduate Students' Association website, even though the Speaker and the Executive Director have been updated. The Governance Committee currently consists only of three members: Jibs, Hazel, and Aashish, with two vacant seats remaining unfilled. In response, I have requested that the Indigenous Graduate Students' Association Core Council, the Governance Committee, the Equity, Diversity, Inclusion Committee, the Elections and Referenda Committee, and the Graduate Students' Association Board meet jointly to discuss these matters and ensure that proper consultation takes place moving forward.

5. Vice President Indigenous Relations on the Governance Committee

The Vice President Indigenous Relations portfolio is designated as a voting member of the Governance Committee. Since the beginning of September, I have been in a scheduled class every Friday from 10 am until 12 pm, which has been communicated as an academic block. Despite this, all Governance Committee meetings this term have been scheduled during this exact time, preventing my participation. Additionally, the Graduate Students Association website has still not been updated to list the Vice President Indigenous Relations as a member of the Governance Committee. The webpage has been updated to include the new Executive Director, Eric, and new Speaker, Laith, but my role continues to be omitted. President Aashish Kumar then attempts to use this against me and try to move all changes that impact Indigenous students (VPIR-related portfolio, stipend, etc.) to the Governance Committee (for him to block, in true anti-democratic process). This ongoing exclusion affects Indigenous representation in governance spaces and continues to create barriers for the portfolio.

6. VPIR Unpaid Stipend

The VPIR stipend remains unpaid due to ongoing resistance from President Aashish Kumar and Executive Director Eric Derksen, despite clear GSA Policy stating that if the stipend is not paid to a VPIR, it *must* go

toward funding for First Nations, Métis, and Inuit students (D.POL.10.1.f.iii). Instead of implementing this straightforward policy unjustified barriers, including claims of audit risk for an ~\$8,000 transfer, attempts to reroute the matter through committees chaired by the President, and anti-democratic practices such as refusing speaking privileges to Departmental Councillor Savannah (Political Science) and graduate student Hero (Law) and passing handwritten notes between the President and Executive Director during Board meetings. We have found evidence at the university of student groups receiving up to \$100,000 with no audit. The GSA has applied a level of scrutiny to Indigenous-directed funds that it does not apply anywhere else, delaying action from July to November (and counting) without justification and contravening the policy that explicitly protects Indigenous representation and funding. This is against Indigenous sovereignty and is a common theme for the GSA with Aashish Kumar as President.

7. GSA Public Apology to the Indigenous Graduate Students' Association

Following the recent meeting with Dr. Florence Glanfield, the GSA Board, and the Indigenous Graduate Students' Association, I have formally requested that the GSA issue a public apology to the IGSA and to myself as the inaugural Vice President Indigenous Relations. This apology is not about placing blame, but about acknowledging the harm and inequities that have occurred, and affirming the GSA's commitment to reconciliation, accountability, cultural safety, and respectful engagement with Indigenous leadership moving forward. My email has been left not responded to, as are much of my other emails that I have sent to these current executives.

8. University Child Care Funding Cuts

I have raised concerns about the University of Alberta's decision to end all funding for its six university-affiliated childcare centres effective January 2026. This change significantly impacts accessibility and equity for graduate student parents through higher fees, longer waitlists, and reduced infant-care capacity. While the Graduate Students' Association has arranged a temporary discount with the Earlybird Childcare Centre, this measure does not address the broader issues of accessibility, proximity, or long-term equity for graduate families. Advocacy should have begun when this issue first emerged in May 2025, but no coordinated response occurred at that time. I am now requesting that the GSA take formal action to support the reinstatement of university funding and the modernization of the childcare policy.

9. Change of Chair for the Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Committee

That GSA Council approve amendments to GSA Policy, Section F: GSA Standing Committees, to designate the Vice President Indigenous Relations as Chair and the Vice President Student Life as Vice Chair of the GSA Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Committee, effective 1 May 2026.

The GSA Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Committee has explicit membership requirements that centre marginalized students. GSA Policy states:

Membership of the GSA Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion Committee shall consist of GSA members who identify as members of equity-seeking groups, including but not limited to Indigenous Peoples, Black peoples, racialized students, persons with disabilities, 2SLGBTQIA plus students, and other marginalized identities.

This establishes that the EDI Committee is a governance space intended for students with lived experience in equity-seeking groups. However, the current Chair position, held by the Vice President Student Life, has no equity-based eligibility requirements. There is no requirement in D.BYL.2.2.d or D.POL.8 for the Vice President Student Life to hold a marginalized identity or lived experience.

By contrast, the Vice President Indigenous Relations is the only Directly Elected Officer position with mandatory equity-based eligibility. As stated in GSA Policy:

The position of Vice President Indigenous Relations will be filled by a GSA member who is a First Nations, Métis, or Inuit student from Canada.

Given the committee's purpose and its membership requirements, it is more appropriate for the Chair to be a Directly Elected Officer who is always a member of an equity-seeking group. The Vice President Indigenous Relations is the only DEO position that consistently meets this requirement. Placing the Vice President Student Life in the Vice Chair role ensures continuity and support without relying on that position for leadership.

While the first three Vice Presidents Student Life (Tiffany, Benjamin, and Hazel) have met the requirements to serve on the committee, there are no requirements or safeguards for future VPSLs. The VPSL is responsible for representing all students and should remain actively involved with the EDI Committee, but it is more appropriate for this position to serve as Vice Chair rather than Chair.

This change reinforces the GSA's commitment to reconciliation, equity, cultural safety, and meaningful governance for marginalized graduate students.

Implementation: If approved, the changes will take effect on 1 May 2026, as the current Vice President Student Life meets the eligibility requirements and is able to continue to serve until the transition.

1. VP SL Report

Dear Council Members,

I hope you are all doing well despite November feeling like everything is happening all at once. In the intensity that is grad school, please take time to care for yourself and reach out to all available resources

should you need them. The following is a report of the meetings I've attended since the last council meeting.

Meeting with President Bill Flanagan – Black Student Leaders Collective

Together with a collective of Black student leaders, and through the Office of the Vice-Provost, Access, Community and Belonging, we met with President Bill Flanagan to reflect on progress made since the 10 Calls to Action established following the murder of George Floyd on May 25, 2020. Over ten student associations shared updates on their communities' experiences and the current realities facing Black students on campus. The opening of the Black-led Research Network Initiative (BRNI) space in HUB was acknowledged as a significant milestone. Students also presented shared priorities moving forward, particularly around safety, dedicated space, and sustainable funding for Black student initiatives.

SGBV Advisory Council Meeting

The Advisory Council shared updates on how the University is continuing to strengthen prevention, support, and accountability around Sexual and Gender-Based Violence, especially for students in practicums, co-ops, and other work-integrated learning settings. A new Experiential Learning Toolkit is being developed to make things clearer for students before they go into placements including what to expect, how to stay safe, and what supports and reporting options are available if something goes wrong. There was a strong emphasis on the University's responsibility to protect students, even when they're learning off campus, and on making these processes feel less confusing and more supportive.

We also heard important updates from the Options Navigation Network and the University of Alberta Sexual Assault Centre. There are now 154 trained staff across campus who can confidentially support students who experience or disclose SGBV by helping them understand their options. The Sexual Assault Centre continues to do impactful work through crisis support, prevention education, and events like Consent Week. Overall, the focus is on making supports more visible and accessible, improving training and accountability, and ensuring students feel safer, believed, and supported both on campus and while learning in external settings.

The University of Alberta Safety and Security Committee (UASSC)

Updates from UASSC focused on strengthening both physical and psychological safety on campus through a shift toward a more anticipatory safety culture. Priorities included expanding fire extinguisher training, reinforcing the message that safety is a shared responsibility, and enhancing incident reporting to capture psychological as well as physical impacts. From the SEAP's key driver analysis is informing the development of a new safety action plan, supported by only a \$300,000 allocation this fiscal year. There is increased attention on psychological safety, with distinct strategies for undergraduates (fostering safe learning environments and help-seeking) and graduate students (improving decision-making structures and support systems). In parallel, overdose response remains a critical concern, with 41 reported

overdoses, including two fatalities and one requiring four doses of naloxone, with peak risk occurring between January and March. Additionally, Safewalk usage continues to decline, and the Students' Union is exploring how their volunteers, who currently operate between 7:00pm and midnight, could play an expanded or redefined role in campus safety moving forward. Should you need company going home late from class or your labs please reach out to them.

MNIF Joint Oversight Committee Meeting

As a committee we're exploring ways of giving a report back to students and the university at large on Mandatory Non-Instructional Fees (MNIFs) in a way that is more accessible and impactful compared to previous years. The annual MNIFs report provides transparency on how student fees support key services that enhance the student experience at the University of Alberta. The report will highlight financial and service impact across Athletics and Recreation, Health and Wellness, and Academic Support, while aligning with the Student Experience Action Plan (SEAP). It will include high-level data on service usage, notable achievements, challenges, and trends, as well as a forward look at priorities and initiatives for the upcoming year, offering a clear understanding of how MNIFs contribute to a safe, supportive, and engaging campus environment.

Student group discussion

Met with our Associate Director and Grant's Coordinator to begin reimagining the process for student group registration, especially for new groups. Existing bylaws and policies provide only a broad overview, and no records were found detailing how registration was previously handled. Conversations with Student Group Services are ongoing, and input from councilors is welcome as we continue shaping this process.

Meeting with former Vice President Student Life

Met with the former VPSL to discuss reviving the graduate student reading groups, with the goal of ensuring they are both engaging and academically enriching. She shared insights on what worked well in the past and I have begun developing a structured framework that would allow students to earn professional development (PD) credits for attending and actively participating in these reading groups, while also ensuring that the sessions provide tangible skill-building, networking opportunities, and a supportive space for interdisciplinary exchange. This initiative is intended to strengthen student engagement and promote ongoing learning outside the formal classroom environment

2. GSA Equality, Diversity & Inclusion Committee Report

The EDIC held another mediation meeting with Indigenous Elder Orest, whose guidance continued to ground the committee in the values and responsibilities of this work. A significant portion of the meeting focused on the unallocated VPIR stipend, where members engaged in extensive discussion around transparency, consultation, and accountability. Following this, the committee passed a motion

unanimously requesting that the GSA Board provide regular updates to EDIC on the VPIR stipend allocation process, in consultation with the BFC, the GSA finance team, and the auditor as required, and that EDIC be meaningfully involved and consulted at each stage. The committee has committed to convening emergency meetings as needed to support timely consultation and will attend relevant BFC meetings where possible. Due to ongoing scheduling challenges, some additional decisions continue to be conducted through e-vote

Dear Members of the GSA Council,

I hope you're all doing well in your academic, professional, and personal pursuits. Below are the details of the meetings I have attended between October 17, 2025, and November 20, 2025:

Student Engagement Events

I had the opportunity to attend several engagement events during this reporting period. The first was the GSA Grad Mixer with the UofA Alumni. The event was highly successful, attracting a large number of attendees. Graduate students connected with alumni, university officials, and representatives, including Chancellor Nizar Somji and President Bill Flanagan. Hazel, our VP Student Life, will be able to share more details. I was also invited to attend the Drop-in Diwali event organized by the ISVS. President Aashish and I participated in this event.

Additionally, I had the chance to attend the Graduate Student Reception, organized by the Student Success and Experience (SSE) office. VP SL Hazel and I engaged with several attendees and collected direct feedback from students about the Health & Dental Plan and other areas of focus for the GSA.

I also attended two graduation ceremonies to represent the GSA and to congratulate our members on their transition after completing their graduate journeys. Lastly, as part of our Know Your Services Campaign, I held another session at CAB, enabling me to engage with new and returning members and assist in answering questions about the services offered by the GSA.

Accessibility & Accommodations Advocacy

For the past few months, I have been seeking information and raising advocacy concerns about additional support for students with limited mobility. I am currently working on ensuring how the GSA can implement some measures to support graduate students who use wheelchairs. While I cannot share specific details, I met with Dr. Carrie Smith to discuss how we can enhance support for students and create avenues for financial assistance for members who do not qualify for Alberta Aids to Daily Living (AADL).

While these discussions will continue, the GSA can create its own fund for eligible members. We will hold internal meetings with the Grants Coordinator and the Executive Director to determine the value and logistics of establishing the fund. It would, however, be helpful if council members could share concerns, feedback, or suggestions regarding this initiative.

GSA Emergency Bursary Discussions

I have been gathering feedback from some of our members, who shared that the eligibility criteria for the GSA Emergency Bursaries can sometimes be confusing or unclear. We have also received feedback on how overall information regarding the EBs can be more streamlined. To address this, we have had

internal meetings involving the Executive Director, the Grants Coordinator, and me. We have also consulted with the Office of the Registrar, which adjudicates the EBs on behalf of the GSA. It is hoped that in the near future, we will be able to incorporate the feedback received and make the information about EBs more accessible.

Health & Dental Plan

We continue to monitor the Health & Dental Plan coverage closely. With the Associate Director officially on board, Zain and I have been coordinating more effectively on how to address student concerns and questions, with the Executive Director and the President involved. We have developed better ways to consolidate and categorize student case information while also focusing on individual cases. It is noteworthy that some issues arose due to the switch to a new plan this year and the new provider's unfamiliarity with certain internal procedures. However, some concerns fall in other categories. Now that we are past the blackout period, we believe that the majority of the lingering issues should have been resolved. For those that remain, Zain and I will continue to raise them with the Studywell representatives.

To better understand student experiences, both positive and negative, we are developing several approaches and planning next steps. In addition to sharing relevant information about plan coverage and frequently asked questions via email updates, the GSA is also organizing a webinar for our members, where they can share their feedback and concerns directly with Studywell representatives.

Furthermore, the GSA will soon launch a survey to gather comprehensive feedback on its overall focus areas, with the Health & Dental Plan as a key element. We value the feedback we receive from our members and remain dedicated to addressing their concerns effectively. The data we obtain will significantly help us assess the new plan's effectiveness and guide future actions and decisions. I will be happy to share more details as needed.

Proposal for a new sub-committee for the GSA Board

We have held some internal meetings in which we began discussions on creating a new sub-committee under the GSA Board's authority. While full details can only be shared once we receive formal approval following the proposal's review by the relevant standing committees, it is important to note that the proposed committee will enable the GSA Board to gather more proactive feedback from members on key service delivery decisions. If the committee is formed, the GSA Board (and the Council) will have better insight into several issues, such as the U-Pass administration, the Health & Dental Plan, bookable student spaces, and usage data for services provided by the university. I will be happy to share more details at a later time.

GSA Tuition Town Hall

On November 20, 2025, the GSA held a Tuition Town Hall to give our members a chance to ask questions about the proposed tuition updates for the 2025-26 academic year. Representatives from the Office of the Provost and university officials, including Dr. Tracy Raivio, Norma Rodenburg, Kathleen Brough, and members of the Nursing Faculty, were in attendance.

After a brief presentation shared by Dr. Tracy and Norma, students had an opportunity to seek clarification and raise concerns in an open Q&A session. While not all questions could be accommodated, it was shared that a subsequent presentation will be held at one of our upcoming Council sessions. Members who still wish to ask questions or seek follow-ups can either contact their respective GSA Departmental Councilors or reach out to the Directly Elected Officers, preferably the VP Academic or the President.

Important Notes:

6. The SSE is offering ***Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training (ASIST)*** to our student communities. There are limited spots available for these dates: Dec 11-Jan 1. Interested councillors can directly contact Kevin Friese at friese@ualberta.ca. Please note that if interested, you will have to attend both days together as shared above.
7. **The Dose of Support** program began on October 16 and will continue until December 18. This is a great way to connect with a clinician from the SSE, with drop-in sessions typically lasting 20 minutes. Please see details [HERE](#).
8. **Influenza Flu Clinics:** Students on the North Campus can get free influenza shots at the health center or the main floor of the pharmacy. This is an intensive campaign running from October 20 to the end of November (you may still be able to get the shots outside of this period; please check). Item 8m: GSA Management Report

We are pleased to present to Council the following management report from the GSA office.

From a governance perspective, it is essential that the Council recognizes that it delegates its authority, not all but some, to its standing committees which may in turn delegate that responsibility to sub-committees or ad-hoc committees. Those latter committees further the initial mandate of the relevant parent standing committee itself.

Due process and lines of authority and responsibility have been established by Council, from necessary governance issues, by-law and policy issues, budgetary considerations, and operational responsibilities. The Council should not, unless in extreme circumstances, take up that delegated authority from its properly constituted standing committees, since all consequential issues and results of Council's decision to take back that authority will fall on Council itself.

Council should be aware that it always has the choice to function by standing committee, or to itself be the standing committee for every area of delegated authority. That reality means all decisions of the GSA fall to the Council, and it would have no need of standing committees. The prerogative of operating in this ill-advised path is prohibitive to effective governance. The Council simply does not want to meet daily.

Council should be cautioned against taking unto itself the delegated authority of a standing committee. To concern itself with both the highest levels of governance and then to dive into operational decision-making in place of a standing committee would be as if one had responsibility on the top floor of an 80 story building and responsibility in the basement level and found oneself riding the elevator all day and not accomplishing much at all.

I would ask Council to repeatedly ask itself the question: does this responsibility lie with a duly constituted standing committee, and if so, refer it back to them. If a financial issue, then the Budget and Finance Committee, then the board. If a disciplinary issue, then the Appeals and Complaints Board. If a policy and governance issue, then the Governance Committee, and then Board.

I include the Board where relevant on two counts. First, ***the Board is the senior administrative authority of the GSA as delegated to it by the GSA Council*** (F.POL.3.2.a). Second, ***GSA Standing Committees advise the GSA Council and the GSA Board (GSAB) on policy relevant to their mandates, and have full authority to take actions set out within those mandates*** (F.BYL.1.2).

I would also remind the Council it has every right, and the responsibility, to ensure its delegated authority is being exercised appropriately by the standing committees it has formed. This means that ***GSA Standing Committees will report regularly to the Council on the proper exercise of their delegated powers. The GSA Labour Relations Committee (GSA LRC) will report to GSA Council for information*** (F.BYL.1.2).

This implies, more than implies actually, that for Council to adequately fulfill its governance responsibility vested by the Province of Alberta, all Council members must be aware of the contents of all reports submitted to Council, and the Council as a whole must be responsible for the adequate composition of all its Standing Committees (through the Nominating Committee). Furthermore, it is the responsibility of Council to ensure all its Standing Committees are functioning adequately, and does so through examination of those committee reports. Council can request further or followup information from any of its committees. This constitutes high level governance. The effective function of Standing Committees within their mandate constitutes the operational responsibility of the GSA delegated respectively by Council.

The two must never be conflated.

Office Reports:

Awards are scheduled to open Dec 1, 2025 - Jan 11, 2026. First People's House is re-opening the Indigenous Student Graduate Award.

Standing Committee and Council-Elected position elections have been in full swing: we are filling LRC Bargaining Team and voting member positions, the ERC, the NoC, the ACB, the ASC, the CAL vacancy, the GSA Speaker position and are currently interviewing DRO candidates. The uptick in GSA member interest in serving on Committees is very encouraging, and the Nominating Committee is doing an excellent job. Work is beginning on General Election preparations with the CRO and ERC to ensure a smooth transition to the next GSA Board in the spring.

The Finance Manager is well engaged and is being brought up to speed on the financial matters of the GSA. Zain Patel was hired as the new Associate Director of the GSA to replace the former AD who resigned in September. Zain is familiar to you as the GSA speaker, and brings both a knowledge of the GSA's history, and relationships with former Executive Directors, and as such provides necessary continuity for the GSA's institutional memory. Zain's interest in policy and governance is an area that will serve the GSA well as it considers structural evaluation for the Council, by-laws, and policies.

Outline of Issue

Recommended Changes to GSA Bylaw and Policy

Suggested Motion:

That the GSA Council **APPROVE** the following GSA Bylaw & Policy Revisions, Section A

Background:

To clarify the priority order of bylaws and policies, the following bylaws are suggested.

Jurisdiction:

GSA Bylaw and Policy, Section A.BYL.1.2

“These Bylaws ... may be amended by two two-thirds majority votes of Council held on seven calendar days’ notice of motion and no less than one week apart.”

GSA Bylaw and Policy, Section A.BYL.2.2

“GSA Policy is under the jurisdiction of GSA Council and may be amended by a simple majority vote of GSA Council at any meeting of GSA Council.”

GSA Bylaw and Policy, Section F.BYL.1.3

“GSA Standing Committees advise GSA Council and the GSA Board (GSAB) on policy relevant to their mandates, and have full authority to take actions set out within those mandates.”

GSA Bylaw and Policy, Section F.POL.4.2.a

“The mandate of the GSA Governance Committee is to “advise GSA Council on matters of GSA Bylaw and Policy not in the purview of any other GSA Standing Committee, or other governance issues, and recommend changes to GSA Council.”

Background:

The ERC and GC have recommended the clarification of I.POL.12.6 to improve fairness in elections procedure.

Jurisdiction:

GSA Bylaw and Policy, Section I.POL.18.4

“The GSA ERC will review GSA Bylaw and Policy on elections and referenda annually and make any recommendations to GSA Council.”

GSA Bylaw and Policy, Section A.BYL.1.2

“These Bylaws ... may be amended by two two-thirds majority votes of Council held on seven calendar days’ notice of motion and no less than one week apart.”

GSA Bylaw and Policy, Section A.BYL.2.2

“GSA Policy is under the jurisdiction of GSA Council and may be amended by a simple majority vote of GSA Council at any meeting of GSA Council.”
